

Why Choose St Albans Woodland Burial ?

We are a charity, this enables us to operate at low cost, not for charge for profit. People choose woodland burial because they value the opportunity to be buried in a beautiful woodland nature reserve, rather than a cemetery. Woodland burial in a natural setting is the very best way to care for the environment and avoids the many problems of both pollution and greenhouse gases associated with cremation. Professor David Bellamy said that woodland burial is a way of giving something back. Burial takes place in individual graves which can be marked with wooden memorials or a cross. Unlike commercial council cemeteries we ask that coffins are made from real wood or naturals materials such as wicker, which will degrade over time. We do not like the now

common practice of plastics used for coffins, or the increasingly synthetic finishes made to look like wood which are now placed over MDF and which can be so damaging to the environment.

St Albans Woodland Burial Ground is one of only two consecrated woodland burial grounds in the country. Most people are surprised to learn that council cemeteries are not consecrated and a grave space or a plot for ashes is only leased for a period of perhaps 40 or 70 years, after which the land can be used for other purposes. It is our privilege to be able to provide a final resting place which, by virtue of being consecrated, is the very best protection afforded in English law. We can be assured that loved ones really do rest in peace.

People choose our woodland for burial and also interment of ashes, and some have been so impressed that they have reserved a particular burial space. Our woodland burial ground is surrounded by 60 acres of planted woodland and open countryside. It is a haven of wildlife and you can expect to see a variety of birds and animals. You are always welcome and if you have a dog they will enjoy the freedom to run. Through consultation with the Forestry Commission and other professionals, we are creating something very special which will be preserved for generations to come.



Suddenly our interest was stirred as we listened to Ian, Charlie and Janet telling us about this wonderful place and how plans were afoot to open it early in 2007. will be able to bring vehicles close to the graveside, alleviating the need to carry for more than a few metres. It is also of considerable advantage for people with disabilities to bring vehicles much nearer to the glade itself. The Trustees considered many different alternatives for construction of the road itself, including various new developments allowing grass to grow through a block construction. After several months of consideration through a variety of different weather conditions, we eventually decided upon a robust constructed road with solid foundations. A recycled brick base with a compounded hogin surface has been finished with a gravel layer to bring a result which we believe will be entirely suitable in all weather, whilst also being extremely pleasing to the eye. The finished surface will be seeded with grass and wild flowers, and allowed to take upon itself a natural appearance. Whilst this has involved a considerable investment, we believe that the finished roadway will bring considerable advantages for many years to come. We are grateful to Mr Bill Elliott for his outstanding workmanship and attention to detail in constructing the roadway.



Woodland Burial - The traditional way

Woodland burial is very traditional and dates back for hundreds of years in England. The funeral shown above represents a most traditional and dignified burial, and is of special significance for Keysoe. The service was for Doris Eveline Garratt, a resident of Keysoe. The Minister was The Reverend Jane Bass, from Keysoe Parish Church and the horse drawn hearse was supplied by Liz from www.carriagehire.co.uk, Temple Farm, Keysoe, Beds. A fine traditional wicker coffin was used, made from Willow, one of the few truly environmentally renewable resources. The willow plant grows on the Somerset Levels and can be harvested annually from the same crown for up to 60 years.

New Road brings better access.

This last year has been an exciting one as we develop and grow the woodland. This year we experienced some really wet days and as a result we decided to take forward plans for a new roadway leading right into the glade. This has many advantages which are appreciated for funeral and visitors alike. Funeral Directors
